This allows me the freedom to know that other than my own reactions to anything that happens; I have zero control of any outcome. I am not in charge! All I can do is let my HP do their thing and be ready to accept it. It is not always easy and I am not always happy about it, but I have learned to accept it. I have found places I belong and find opportunities to learn and grow and serve and remember and forgive. I have the truth about how to look at things that brings me peace and I faith and hope that brings me joy. I used to joke that as people come closer to the end of life they seem to get closer to "GOD" and that it was really to clear their conscience but perhaps sometimes it takes some of us just a little longer to realize we do not really control much in life and that if we don't find faith, love , joy, acceptance, harmony, and most of all; if we don't find our way to forgiveness we will NEVER find our way to happiness. This is maybe the biggest lesson I have learned, forgiveness, that is what allows me to be ok today. It really is for me not them. I no longer carry the weight of resentments and hurts and this has allowed me to let go of compulsive behaviors that are self-destructive ad really

The Spirit of Tradition Eleven - Lifeline (oalifeline.org)

My earliest memories are of me playing in front of the mirror. The game I played consisted of me pretending to be famous and answering questions from an invisible interviewer. I remember what a blast it was, mimicking TV commercials, award ceremonies, and entertainment shows. Twenty years later, I found myself in a public relations and marketing career, getting paid to promote, persuade, and motivate.

Discovering Tradition Eleven (and frankly, all the Steps and Traditions) was like encountering a foreign language. No promotion? No celebrity endorsements? No film at eleven? I initially rationalized Tradition Eleven's anonymity Principle this way: We in OA have a disease that we should be ashamed of. Keep it secret.

As I continue to bring my sick body and mind to meetings, however, I also heard such concepts as "we are as sick as our secrets." I figured it was important to share honestly at meetings, but nowhere else. OA meetings were islands of safety and respite, like the island of Molokai was for those with leprosy.

Higher Power has given me many opportunities to understand Tradition Eleven in the spirit that it was written. In recovery, we in OA are not ashamed of our illness. We want to carry the message to those who still suffer. The vehicles we have chosen to carry this message, however, are not promotion based. They are attraction based. But what does this mean? In both my career and my childhood fantasies, to attract always meant to promote aggressively and competitively.

Today, I understand that promotion of OA with spokespersons or advertising rollouts would harm individual members and the recovery community. Our "advertising" has a different look and feel: It is in the quiet of a newcomer's abstinence that I feel hope. It is in the humility of a relapsing long timer that I experience gratitude. It is in the perseverance of members who are in pain that I know recovery. It is in giving anonymous service that I feel rewarded. I am deeply moved and attracted by these authentic experiences.

Though I still love makeover shows that transform individuals in thirty minutes, I don't trust them as real. I do trust Overeaters Anonymous because I have learned over the years that humility is the best public relations policy, and carrying the message can be done over time, with love rather than ego leading the way.— Edited and reprinted from Today newsletter, St. Louis Bi-State Area Intergroup, November 2005

Service above the group level was never in my plans, but as I write this, I am the treasurer for my region. Thanks to my region-level service, I am about 30 pounds (14 kg) lighter!

After twelve years of recovery and maintaining a 40-pound (18-kg) weight loss, I thought my weight-loss days were over, and I was comfortable with that. But I guess the God of my understanding wanted more, both for me and from me.

About five years ago, I found my way to an emergency intergroup meeting. Our intergroup board was concerned that the same few people had been doing all the service far too long; that unless they recruited new members and rotated service, the intergroup would fold. Because I would have hated to see an end to our newsletter, our updated meeting lists, our hotline for newcomers, and our strong connection with region and the World Service Office, I thought I could do some small part to help.

I volunteered at that meeting to take the minutes because they had no secretary. At the next meeting, they asked if I would be willing to take that job for the foreseeable future. I didn't accept until I talked to my sponsor and prayed about it. When I did accept, I said okay, as long as I didn't have to move through the service chairs. They said, "Oh no; you only have to do as much as you want to."

Well, two years later, I was vice chair and then chair; I was a region representative and a world service representative. Next, I was a funded chair at region, then treasurer for my intergroup, and now treasurer on the region board! It certainly wasn't my doing, but as a program friend is fond of saying, "I've been bitten by the service bug!" I've loved every phase of it, proving once again that my HP knows better than I do what's best for me.

Meanwhile, I'd been thinking about changing my food plan and praying for willingness because I didn't want to do it, even though I did want to lose more weight. At the March assembly, I talked to a dear program friend whose recovery I'd been watching. She explained her food plan and suggested I write down everything I ate on my current plan until the end of the month.

Then, on April 1, I could try the new plan one day at a time while continuing to write down everything I ate. I agreed to start writing down my food. The next day, I heard the closing speaker share about her own goal to get to a healthy weight, even though she'd already lost quite a bit. Those two people were the angels my HP sent to inspire the willingness I needed. On April 1, I began my new food plan, giving up foods I'd been unwilling to give up just a few days earlier. Today I'm about 30 pounds (14 kg) lighter. I owe it all to my region service and to being right where I needed to be to hear what I needed to hear. Thank you, God and my region (and my intergroup for choosing me to represent them). Today I'm a happier, healthier, and thinner recovering food addict.

TOOL OF THE MONTH: Abstinence and Recovery

Abstinence is the *act of refraining* from compulsive eating and compulsive food behaviors while working towards or maintaining a healthy body weight.

Recovery is the *removal of the need* to engage in compulsive eating behaviors. Spiritual, emotional, and physical recovery is achieved through working and living the Overeaters Anonymous Twelve-Step program.

Simply refraining from eating whatever I want, whenever I want, while working towards a healthy body weight (abstinence) is essentially the description of every diet I've ever done. Yet my experience of abstinence felt like much more than that—when I put down the food, that was an action; when the insanity left, that was a miracle! I lumped that feeling into abstinence, but that made it a difficult idea to define, let alone pass on to someone else. What I was missing was the clarity that this two-part definition highlights: recovery is where the miracle lives. Abstinence is surely a result of recovery, but abstinence must be defined individually through self-honesty. Recovery, on the other hand, is universal. —Cory, Triangle IG WSO Rep at the WSBC that passed this two-part definition.

Requirements and Duties of Committee Chairs	Abstinence	
Newsletter Editor	30 days	Creates the Triangle OA Intergroup newsletter, which contains IG meeting reports, information about each of the meetings in the Intergroup, upcoming events, and writings by members on the steps, traditions, and other OA related topics. The newsletter is a vehicle of communication for members and is often distributed to the public.
Newsletter Distributor	30 days	Distributes the Triangle OA Intergroup newsletter. Picks up newsletters either at the printer and brings to IG meeting or picks up at monthly IG meeting if someone else is picking up from printer. Maintains a list of contacts and mailing addresses for each meeting in IG; brings that list to IG meeting so reps present can sign out newsletters, and mails newsletters to any not present.
High Tech/ Webmaster	30 days	Maintains the Triangle OA Intergroup website (triangleoa.org) as a communication tool and storage facility for Intergroup documents and handles anything else related to the internet as a communication vehicle. Coordinates the posting of IG information such as upcoming events, reports, resource material, mailing lists, mail accounts, and newsletters to the website. Coordinates the forwarding of email to the proper people and maintains the email boxes and email distribution lists.
Retreat chair and registrar	6 months	Organizes retreats for OA members to strengthen their recovery with focused fellowship. Retreats also function as fund-raisers for Intergroup to carry the message of recovery to current, past and future members. Duties generally divided between a chair and a registrar.
PIPO	30 days	Provides information to the public, medical professionals, and other groups that work with compulsive eaters by attending health fairs, distributing public service announcements, putting meeting information in external media, hosting sessions for medical professionals, counselors, clergy and other special interest groups interested in a solution to the disease of compulsive eating. Has an outgoing email address for anonymity?
Group Outreach	30 days	Contacts member groups, organizes visits to groups, maintains information about each group, and ensures the Triangle Intergroup serves the member groups. Updates the phone line with face to face meeting info. Contacts all groups and reps at least yearly; monitors the OA website for new groups in our area. Keeps a master list of group information and makes sure the info on the Triangle IG website, the national website, the phone line, in the newsletter, and used by PIPO for outside media is current. Maintains the list of Intergroup reps and coordinates with the Newsletter Distributor to maintain the mailing addresses used for the Newsletter Distribution.
Twelfth Step Within	30 days	Brings the message of recovery to suffering compulsive eaters within the fellowship by hosting special events and supporting member groups hosting special events.

Parliamentarian

30 days

Is knowledgeable about procedures in Roberts Rules of Order and Group Conscience. Attends the Intergroup meetings and guides the chair in running the meeting according to these principles
